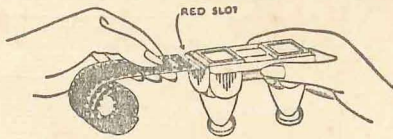


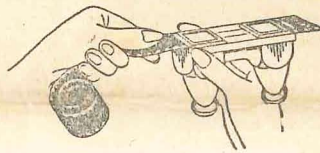
## NOVELVIEW 3 DIMENSION PICTURES

### DIRECTIONS

#### HOW TO USE THE NOVELVIEWER



With CURL of film downwards (as in picture) insert end of film marked "START" through RED slot.



Slide film through until WHITE line appears.



Main title is now in position.  
Turn knob to left and SKIP  
ONE PICTURE EACH TIME

QUESTION: Why must you skip a picture each time?

ANSWER: To bring the pictures into their proper positions.
